





Criteria for excellent qualitative research

What makes an excellent qualitative research study?

Table 1. Eight "Big-Tent" Criteria for Excellent Qualitative Research	
Criteria for quality (end goal)	Various means, practices, and methods through which to achieve
Vorthy topic	The topic of the research is Relevant Timely Significant Interesting
Rich rigor	The study uses sufficient, abundant, appropriate, and complex Theoretical constructs Data and time in the field Sample(s) Context(s) Data collection and analysis processes
Sincerity	The study is characterized by Self-reflexivity about subjective values, biases, and inclinations of the researcher(s) Transparency about the methods and challenges
Credibility	 The research is marked by Thick description, concrete detail, explication of tacit (nontextual) knowledge, and showing rat than telling Triangulation or crystallization Multivocality Member reflections
Resonance	The research influences, affects, or moves particular readers or a variety of audiences through Aesthetic, evocative representation Naturalistic generalizations Transferable findings
Significant contribution	The research provides a significant contribution Conceptually/theoretically Practically Morally Methodologically Heuristically
Ethical	The research considers Procedural ethics (such as human subjects) Situational and culturally specific ethics Relational ethics Exiting ethics (leaving the scene and sharing the research)
Meaningful coherence	 The study Achieves what it purports to be about Uses methods and procedures that fit its stated goals Meaningfully interconnects literature, research questions/foci, findings, and interpretations with other
